A network of Chinese temples was established in Southeast Asia over a 500 year process. These temples were centers of worship, but also of business and trade. They were also points of contact with local cultures, and the sites of many experiments in ritual change and cultural interaction and hybridity. Successful socio-cultural and institutional changes were adapted back in the home regions of the Chinese diaspore, making Southeast Asia a vast field of experimentation and enriching the local cultural repertoire.

Prof. Kenneth Dean is James McGill Professor and Drs. Richard Charles and Esther Yewpick Lee Chair of Chinese Cultural Studies in the Department of East Asian Studies of McGill University.
