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Academic philosophy today no longer considers its subject-matter exclusively in terms of a Greek invention and European tradition. Asian texts and contexts are increasingly included in philosophical work across all disciplines – from epistemology to environmental ethics. Figures such as Avicenna, Gotama, Confucius and Nishida Kitarō are each being researched in their own right as well as in cross-reference to Aristotelian, Kantian or Heideggerian philosophy. We have invited four leading scholars to present their work and to exemplify how philosophy can be researched today in the respective contexts of the Arabic-Islamic world, India, China and Japan.

The Spring 2010 Lecture Series is an activity of the URPP's Research Field "Concepts and Taxonomies".

#### The Sense and Significance of Japanese Philosophy

**Dimitri Gutas** is Professor of Arabic and Graeco-Arabic at Yale University in New Haven. He studies and teaches medieval Arabic and the medieval intellectual tradition in Islamic civilization, focusing on the transmission of Greek scientific and philosophical works into the Islamic world. Professor Gutas has concentrated in particular on Ibn Sina (known as Avicenna in the medieval Latin world), on whom he wrote *Avicenna and the Aristotelian Tradition* (1988). His award-winning *Greek Thought, Arabic Culture* (1998) has been translated into seven languages.

**Arindam Chakrabarti** currently is Research Professor at the National Institute of Advanced Studies in Bangalore and a tenured Professor of Philosophy at the University of Hawai'i. After being trained as an analytic philosopher of language at Oxford, he has spent several years receiving traditional training in Indian logic (Navya Nyāya) and metaphysics which made him fluent in Sanskrit. Professor Chakrabarti has edited or authored several books and articles, including *Knowing from Words* (with B. K. Matilal, 1995), *Denying Existence* (1997) and *Universals, Concepts, and Qualities* (with P. Strawson, 2006).

**Roger T. Ames** is Professor of Philosophy at the University of Hawai'i and editor of Philosophy East & West (since 1987). Recently, he has been visiting professor at Beijing University, the Chinese University of Hong Kong and Wuhan University. He has published translations of a great number of Chinese classics and many interpretative studies of Chinese philosophy and culture, such as the influential trilogy with D. L. Hall: *Thinking Through Confucius* (1987), *Anticipating China* (1995) and *Thinking from the Han* (1998). His latest work is *The Chinese Classic of Family Reverence* (with H. Rosemont, 2009).

**John C. Maraldo** is Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at the University of North Florida. He earned a Dr.phil. from the University of Munich with a dissertation on Schleiermacher, Dilthey und Heidegger and then spent several years in Japan studying Japanese philosophy and Zen Buddhism. He has been a guest professor at the University of Kyoto and the Catholic University in Leuven, and last year held the Roche Chair in Interreligious Research at Nanzan University. Professor Maraldo is currently co-editing *Japanese Philosophy: A Sourcebook* (with J. W. Heisig and T. P. Kasulis).

The University Research Priority Program (URPP) Asia and Europe of Zurich University explores exchanges and encounters that have taken and continue to take place between Asia and Europe in the areas of culture, law, religion and society.
